

At a regular meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, held on this the 11 day of February, 1965, the following business was transacted:

Hayden Allan was sworn in as the new Mayor of Kimball by the Honorable Sam Neal, Justice of the Peace.

James R. Shook was sworn in as Alderman.

At this time Mayor Gordon Hill turned all City books over to Mayor Allan.

There being no business at this time, the meeting was adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, held on this the 11th day of March, 1965, all members being present, the following business was transacted: Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Financial report was given.

Paul A. Swafford was present at the invitation of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen for the purpose of discussing his employment at Attorney for the Town. After discussion of the need for an Attorney for the Town, upon motion of Mayor Allen, seconded by Alderman Shook and passed by unanimous vote, Paul A. Swafford was employed as Attorney for the Town for the salary of \$50.00 per month, the first payment to be for the month of March, 1965.

All ordinances heretofore passed by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen were reviewed and it appeared to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen that none of these ordinances had been recorded in a Book of Ordinances, and that signed copies of all ordinances heretofore passed were not available, it was decided after recommendation by the City Attorney that all ordinances be re-enacted by the present Board of Mayor and Aldermen, and make such changes as might appear proper and that such re-enacted ordinances carry the same number as the original ordinances. Thereupon after discussion, upon motion of Alderman Shook, seconded by Alderman Haynes and passed by unanimous vote, the following ordinances were passed upon first reading, the vote on all ordinances being unanimous.

Ordinance No. 1, this being an ordinance to prescribe the form of ordinances for the Town of Kimball, Tennessee.

Ordinance No. 2, this being an ordinance to regulate the sale of beer and/or ale and other beverages of like alcoholic content within the limits of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee.

Ordinance No. 3, this being an ordinance to create the office of Recorder and Treasurer for the Town of Kimball, Tennessee.

Ordinance No. 4, this being an ordinance to regulate the sale of Fireworks in the Town of Kimball, Tennessee.

Ordinance No. 5, an ordinance to regulate the disposal of wastes within the corporate limits of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee.

Ordinance No. 6, this being an ordinance to regulate the operation of motor vehicles in the Town of Kimball, Tennessee.

After passage of the above ordinances, all of which are re-enactments of prior ordinances passed by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, upon motion of Mayor Allen, seconded by Alderman Shook, the following ordinance was passed by unanimous vote:

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At a regular meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, held on this the 26th day of March, 1965, all members being present, the following business was conducted:

The financial report was given.

Bill from The Jasper Journal for printing the ballots for election was presented and payment of this bill was approved.

Upon motion of Mayor Allen, seconded by Alderman Shook, and passed by unanimous vote, proposed ordinances No. 1 through 7, were passed on second reading.

Proposed ordinance, ^{No 8} this being an ordinance to prescribe minimum standards for new streets, was read and upon motion of Mayor Allen, seconded by Alderman Haynes, this ordinance was passed on first reading by unanimous vote.

The matter of attempting to purchase or lease the Kimball School property from the Marion County Board of Education was discussed and it was decided to meet with the School Board as soon as a meeting could be arranged for the purpose of trying to work out a satisfactory agreement.

After discussion, it was decided that the Town should investigate the possibility of purchasing a lot for future use as a site for a town building.

Mayor Allen reported that he had contacted Mr. Walter Hackworth of Jasper, Tennessee, in reference to making an audit of the Town records, and that Mr. Hackworth stated that he would make the audit, but could not do so until sometime after April 15th. Mayor Allen further stated that Mr. Hackworth informed him that he would have the services of a Certified Public Accountant assisting with the audit.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, held on the 8th. day of April, 1965, all members being present, the following business was transacted.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and a financial report was given.

Proposed ordinances 1 through 7 were passed upon 3rd and final reading and the Recorder was directed to record these ordinances in the Book of Ordinances of the Town.

Proposed ordinance No 8 was passed upon 2nd reading.

Possible street improvements were discussed, and the problem caused by the narrowness of the "Cove Road" was considered. All members were in agreement that this road should be widened if sufficient right of way could be obtained, but it was pointed out that certain houses located very near the road would make it very difficult to get enough right of way at a price the Town could afford. It was decided to look int the possibility of widening at least part of this road, and to check the possibility of improving the drainage along the road.

Alderman Haynes stated that the Town should make an effort to get the interchange at the Interstate Highway lighted so that the Town's businesses might be in a better position as to securing customers from the Interstate when the highway is completed. It was pointed out that South Pittsburg should also be interested in getting the Interchange lighted. All members agreed that State Highway Officials should be contacted for the purpose of determining what can be done about getting this interchange lighted.

Further discussion was held in reference to getting a site for a Town building and also to continue efforts to work out some kind of agreement whereby the Town can get the use of the Kimball Elementary School property, either by lease or purchase.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.


The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on April 22, 1965.

The problem of garbage disposal in the Town of Kimball was discussed and Alderman Haynes pointed out that there needs to be developed a suitable dump site on the property which is jointly owned by the Town of Kimball and the Town of Jasper. It was agreed to take this matter under consideration and try to work out an arrangement whereby the property owned by the two Towns can be more satisfactorily used as a site for garbage disposal.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on May 13, 1965.


Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and financial report was given.

Mayor Allan brought to the attention of the Board, the matter of getting lights installed on the Interstate access, and discussed a letter received by the Town Attorney from Highway Commissioner Pack in which it was stated there was presently no plans for lighting on the interchange, but that the Highway Department would cooperate in efforts to get lighting provided. After discussion it was decided to write letters to persons who might be of help in getting lighting facilities provided on the interchange. The Town Attorney was directed to prepare suitable letters to be signed by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen and the businessmen of the Town.

Mayor Allan reported that no progress had been made toward working out an agreement with the School Board for the use of the Kimball School Property, and that efforts should be continued to try to get a satisfactory agreement worked out with the School Board.

The problem of beer permits was discussed and it was decided to check the places of business to see if proper permits had been obtained. The Town Attorney was directed to prepare a suitable form for beer permit applications.

After discussion of the matters of interest to the Town, and there being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

May 27, 1965

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball met at regular meeting on May 27, 1965. Present Mayor Allan and Alderman Haynes. Alderman Shook was absent.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and financial report was given.

Acting as Beer Board of the Town of Kimball, the members present considered the beer permit application of Buford Swafford, seeking permission to sell beer at the Dixie Lee Cafe. The application was read and found to be in the proper form, and after due consideration, upon motion by Mayor Allan, seconded by Alderman Haynes, the members present voted unanimously to grant the beer permit as requested by the applicant, Buford Swafford.

The need for getting lights installed on the proposed freeway interchange was discussed and it was decided to send letters signed by the Mayor and Aldermen and businessmen of the Town of Kimball to the Tennessee Senators and the Congressman for this District, and other persons who might be of assistance in getting plans for lighting the interchange approved. Letters for this purpose as prepared by the Town Attorney were approved and it was decided to get these letters signed and mailed at an early date.

The request of E. P. Govan, Jr., d/b/a Television Cable Company, for an ordinance granting him the right to construct and operate a TV Cable System in the Town of Kimball was considered. The proposed ordinance was presented by Mr. Govan and considered, and this ordinance was given to the Town Attorney for study and possible revision, and to be considered at a later meeting.

Mayor Allan reported that no progress had been made toward working out an agreement with the School Board whereby the Town could get the use of the Kimball School Building, but that he was still trying to work out a satisfactory agreement and hoped to arrange for a meeting with the School Board.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on June 10, 1965.

All members were present. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved, and financial report was given.

Alderman Shook reported that he had information to the effect that an agreement could possibly be worked out with the school board whereby the Town could get the use of the school property, and with the understanding that the school board might want to use one room and the cafeteria for a retarded children program. In the event the school board ever wanted the use of the whole property, the Town would be reimbursed for any improvements made on the property. He stated that this information was unofficial. All members were in agreement that such arrangement should be made if possible.

Mayor Allan reported that the Sequachee Valley Electric Cooperative had not yet made a survey and estimate of installing street lights along the highway in Kimball, but that they had promised this would be done within a short time.

It was decided to vote at the next meeting on T.V. Cable franchise application of Eaton P. Govan, Jr., provided letter outlining what he desired had been received from Mr. Govan at that time.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on the 24th day of June, 1965, all members being present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved, and financial report was given.

Alderman Shook stated that he and Alderman Haynes had gone over the roads of Kimball with a representative of the State Highway Department, and that they decided there was not sufficient need for road repairs to justify entering into a contract with the State, and that they could probably work out arrangements with the County for doing any needed road repairs.

Mayor Allan stated that a tentative agreement had been worked out whereby the Marion County School Board would let the Town use one room of the Kimball School property for an office building, with the rest of the building to be used for the mentally retarded program sponsored by the Jaycees. He further stated that in connection with the tentative arrangements, the Town of Kimball was to pay part of the expense of lowering the ceiling in the building and pay part of the electric bill.

Upon motion of Mayor Allan and seconded by Alderman Shook and passed unanimously, Ordinance No. 8, this being an ordinance granting a franchise to E. P. Govan, Jr., d/b/a Television Cable Company, to construct and operate a T.V. Cable system in the Town of Kimball, was passed on first reading.

After general discussion, there being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on the 5th day of August, 1965, all members being present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved and financial report was given.

Ordinance No. 9 granting TV cable franchise to E. P. Govan, Jr., was passed on third and final reading.

On motion of Alderman Shook, seconded by Alderman Haynes, \$1500.00 was appropriated for authorized use in repairing the Kimball School building for office space and cleaning the ground, this amount to be used under agreement with the School Board whereby the Town is to have the use of one room for a Town Office, and pay the electric bill on the building when the school for retarded children is not in session.

Upon motion of Mayor Allan, seconded by Alderman Haynes, payment of \$250.00 to W. N. Hackworth for making audit of the Town records for the years 1963 and 1964 was approved.

The need for police protection in the Town of Kimball was discussed, but no decision was made in reference to this.

It was unanimously agreed to join the Tennessee Municipal League, and the sum of \$58.00 was appropriated from the general fund for the first years dues.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on the 9th day of September, 1965, all members being present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved and financial report was given.

In connection with the financial report, Mayor Allan announced that the Town had \$11,944.35 in the general fund, and \$5,588.95 in the road fund, and that the road fund had received a special distribution of \$741.33 from the special distribution recently made by the State to the Cities and Towns of Tennessee.

There was a general discussion of the work on the Kimball School Property.

It was decided to have the ditch lines on the streets cleaned and a small amount of needed patching done on the pavement.

It was agreed that it would be advisable to install three caution lights along Highway 41 within the Town Limits, and Mayor Allan was authorized to make necessary arrangements for purchasing and installing these lights.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, met at regular meeting on the 23rd day of September, 1965, all members being present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Financial report was given, showing a balance of \$5931.44 in the Road Fund, and \$12,455.32 in the General Fund.

In reference to streets, it was agreed that the best policy at the present time would be to employ someone with a truck to haul enough mix to fill in the few bad holes and try to get the ditch lines pulled, and let money accumulate in the general fund for possible resurfacing of streets next year.

Mayor Allan gave a report on the progress of repairs on the school building and the town office to be located therein.

The problem of garbage pick up was discussed and all members were in agreement that for the present, garbage collection should be left on an individual contract pick up basis, and that the Town could not afford to provide garbage pick up service.

Mayor Allan reported that he had heard nothing from the Sequachee Valley Electric Cooperative in reference to installing street lights, and had heard nothing further from the State in regard to the possibility of getting lights installed on the interchange. It was decided to write to the State Highway Department and see if there was any additional information needed as assurance that the Town would be responsible for electric bills and maintenance of lights on the interchange if such lights are installed.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Town attorney was directed to contact the Election Commission in reference to this, and advise the Election Commission that the election should be advertised for election of a Mayor to fill the unexpired term of Mayor Allan (Mayor Allan having stated that he was going to resign before the election date) and for an Alderman for the Town for a term of two years.



