

Mayor Bennett called the meeting to transact business concerning the police car and any other business presented.



Mr. Prince said he would start on this immediately.

Alderman Peoples said that several people had requested some lights for the tennis and basketball court, and that he had asked the S.V.E.C. to plan this lighting and that he didn't know at this time what they would recommend.


Alderman Blevins expressed a desire to fence in the tennis court so that it could be used by those desiring to play tennis. He is to see about this.

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The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee held it's regular meeting April 27, 1972, all members being present. Attorneys Paul Kelly and Bob Leiderman, City Policeman John Hargis, and Fire Chief Joe Holder were also present.

The meeting was called to order and the minutes of the last meeting were read.

Attorney Bob Leiderman explained what had been done to date on the annexation and read a resolution that he had prepared. Alderman Peoples made a motion that the resolution be approved, which was seconded by Alderman Blevins. The vote was unanimous that the resolution be approved. Attorney Bob Leiderman requested that a date be set for a public hearing on the annexation. The date approved was the 25th of May.

Attorney Bob Leiderman reported that a company had been appointed to insure the Policeman and requested a list of all policies on the Town of Kimball properties.

The specifications for city water improvements in order to get a fire rating and insurance benefits was supplied the city by Mr. Hulme. Attorney Paul Kelly said that he would put these in the proper hands for consideration.

Alderman Peoples made a motion that the Town of Kimball deposit \$5000.00 in the Citizens State Bank. This amount to be in savings.

Mayor Bennett asked Attorney Paul Kelly if any further information had been received concerning the large signs or billboards. He reported that as yet no legislation had been passed changing the situation.

Alderman Peoples stated that he had checked with the Co-op about lighting the tennis court and that the cost would be about \$400.00. No decision was made on this as sufficient light is needed and further consideration is needed.

Alderman Blevins reported that he had checked with Claude Brown about fixing the tennis court and was in the process of getting prices for fencing the tennis court and installing some on the hi-way side of the ball field.

Alderman Blevins made a motion that the Town of Kimball purchase three uniforms for City Policeman Hargis and one for Joe Holder. Alderman Peoples seconded this motion. The vote was unanimous.

Alderman Peoples made a motion that we purchase a shotgun and mounts for the police car and also signs for the police car. Alderman Blevins seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Also to consider a Resolution concerning an additional one half cent sales tax in Marion County for the purpose of new school construction and school repairs, and to transact any other business that would come at the regular meeting, the following Thursday, regular meeting night.

After discussion of said ordinance, Alderman Peoples made a motion that the Ordinance be passed on first reading. The motion was seconded by Alderman Blevins. The vote was unanimous and said Ordinance was passed on first reading.

The Resolution concerning the one-half cent sales tax was discussed and understood that the Town of Kimball would not receive any part of this sales tax, and that it would all go to Marion County for the purpose of School construction, and repairs. Alderman Peoples made a motion that this Resolution be adopted. It was seconded by Alderman Blevins. The vote was unanimous.

Alderman Peoples reported that the SVEC was so far behind with their work that no decision had been made on the lighting of the tennis court. They will get to it as soon as possible.

Alderman Blevins was authorized to have the brush cut on and around the Kimball School property.

Alderman Blevins said that he thought the State Highway department would install the stop signs at the streets entering the Hi-Way.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

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
The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee held its regular meeting July 27, 1972. All members being present.

Mayor Bennett reported that he had no further information as to the annexation, but as far as he knew there was nothing to keep it from going through.



The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Kimball, Tennessee, held its regular meeting the 27th day of September, 1972. Alderman Peoples, Alderman Blevins and Mayor Bennett being present.

A group of local citizens, 12 men, attended the meeting to protest the locating of house trailers within the city limits of Kimball. These men included:

These men wanted to stop installations that were already started and to permit no additional trailers to locate in the Town. Mr. Hudson said he thought it would be alright for a person to put a trailer on his property if it belonged to him or a relative (son or daughter). Mayor Bennett called Mr. Frank Woodfin and advised him to stop until something could be worked out. Alderman Peoples was to call Ronald Hudson and advise him in the same way. Mayor Bennett called Attorney Paul Kelly and also Attorney Bob Leiderman but was unable to reach either of them. Alderman Peoples made a motion that we consider this as a proposal to proceed with the necessary action to get this under way. Mayor Bennett said that he would contact the attorneys the following morning. It was agreed that there would be a called meeting immediately concerning this.

Mayor Bennett received a request from the Marion County Civil Defense, Mutt Link, asking for a contribution of \$250.00 to help buy an emergency vehicle for this area. The donations were:

Kimball	250.00

The truck would cost \$10,000.00 with local funds of \$5,000.00 and government funds of \$5,000.00. Alderman Peoples made a motion that we give this money, seconded by Mayor Bennett. The vote being unanimous.

Mayor Bennett, Alderman Peoples and Alderman Blevins agreed to give Policeman John Hargis a raise of \$10.00 a week, and Barney Nunley a raise of \$2.50 for each day worked on garbage pick-up.

Mayor Bennett reported that the money had been refunded to the Town of Kimball for 100 shares of stock in the amount of \$1,000.00 from the Tri-County Development Corporation, Inc., (Tennessee Metallurgical Corp.)

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.
